## NOVEMBER MATCH SUMMARY

The month began with the second leg of the Texaco Cup match against Morton, at Molineux, having won the first leg 3-0 in Scotland. Wolves despite attacking for nearly all of the game, lost 2-1, Curran scored the Wolves goal coming on as a second-half substitute.

The months League programme started with the local derby against West Brom. Wolves began where they left off on the previous Tuesday, by attacking for nearly all of the game. After only two minutes, Cumbes, the Albion keeper, turned an in-swinging corner from Wagstaffe into his own net. That started the Wolves onslaught with Wolves controlling the game. It was only Cumbes who saved Albion from a hammering, but even he was powerless to stop a brilliant 35-yarder from McAlle which the ref. disallowed for off-side.

So to the second-half and Wolves scored without an Albion player touching the ball; Dougan, being the scorer, converted a left wing cross. With Wolves walking away with the game Lovett pulled back a consolation goal for Albion, so the Wolves ran out 2-1 winners.

On to London the following week for the first of 4 visits to the capital in as many weeks. West Ham were the hosts.

Wolves again found the net early through McCalliog who, following up a Curran shot, pushed the ball home. This goal put life into West Ham who forcefully came forward and deservedly equalised with a Best header. With the score 1-1 at half-time the second-half promised much.

We were not to be denied more goals for long. After 50 minutes Bobby Moore 30 yards out volleyed a clearance past an astonished Parkes. Wolves were really up against it now. Then came a tremendous double blow: Best headed a third for West Ham and Parkin was carried off with a twisted ankle. It looked dismal for Wolves with only 10 minutes left and 3-1 down. Then Wolves sprung to life and within 5 minutes had levelled the score and Curran had also hit the bar. After 83 minutes McCalliog scored with a fierce 25 yard drive following a good run by Bailey; two minutes later Curran hit the bar after Richards had split the West Ham defence. A minute later Gould tapped the ball home after McAlle had sent the ball across the face of goal via a post. A good point after all seemed lost.

The League leaders, Leeds United, were visitors to Molineux in the third match of the nonth. In an evenly contested match Wolves were perhaps unlucky to lose by the odd goal in five.

The first-half was only 12 minutes old when Clarke put Leeds ahead following a Giles free kick. Wolves hit back and in the 23rd minute they scored through Gould. This followed probably the best move of the season: Curran sent a long ball down the wing to McCalliog who

centred for Gould to send a deft flick past Sprake. Alas, tragedy struck in the 37th minute when Holsgrove had the misfortune to put the ball in his own net. This disheartened Wolves and Madeley headed a neat third just before half-time. It looked all over for Wolves.

Wolves, however, were not finished and just after the interval Curran scored with a header following a Bailey free kick. Although Wolves kept up pounding the Leeds goal they failed to equalise; so Wolves suffered their third home defeat of the season.

So to the final game of the month and another visit to London, this time at Crystal Palace. This was a very drab game and could be due to the fact that both sides had five first team regulars missing from the line up.

Apart from the two goals in this 1-1 draw, there was little else to mention. Scott put Palace ahead after 36 minutes with a shot in off the post, and Curran slotted home the equaliser from a Wagstaffe cross in the 67th minute. Bernard Shaw's brave performance cannot be omitted - he received a head wound in the opening minutes and in the dying seconds he saved a point with a tremendous goal-line clearance.

#### PEN PICTURES

This months pen-pictures features two of Wolves youngsters who have come into the limelight this season.

#### JOHN RICHARDS

John Richards was born on the 9th November, 1950, in Warrington, Lancashire.

John's football career started whilst he was at junior school, when he captained Warrington junior schools side from 1960 to 1962; during this time he played in the position of right-half.

On leaving junior school he attended "Boteler Grammar School". It was whilst he was at Boteler that he switched to playing up front. Here John was enjoying fantastic success, for as well as playing for the Warrington Under-18 side, during which they won the Lancashire Cup and were finalists the following year, he also represented Lancashire Schools from 1967-69.

The highlight of John's school football career was yet to come. He represented England Senior Schoolboys against Wales at Reading, and against Scotland at Ibrox. John scored two goals in the 7-1 thrashing of Wales; the second, which he rates as his best to date, was a dazzling volley. John failed to find the net against Scotland and England lost 1-0.

After these internationals John was invited to join Wolves, and in April 1969 he made his Central League debut in which Wolves beat Derby 4-0. Soon after in June he signed professional forms with Wolves.

Many will remember his first team debut against the old enemy, West Brom., at the Hawthorns in February 1970, when he gave a creditable performance in helping Wolves to a 3-3 draw.

In his short professional career so far, he rates Larry Lloyd of Liverpool the best defender he has encountered, and he has a great admiration for Mike England. John says "He looks a tower of strength, except when against the Doog".

#### KEN HIBBITT

Ken Hibbitt was born in Bradford and he started his career with Bradford Park Avenue at the age of 15, and after 15 appearances, two as substitute, Wolves salvaged him from the ill-fated Bradford for £5,000 only two years ago. Apart from one appearance as substitute, he did not play in the First Division until this season.

Ken made his Wolves debut during the torrential downpour on the 12th September against Chelsea, at Stamford Bridge. Ken scored Wolves first goal in a 2-2 draw, which Ken says made it his most memorable game so far. Since the Chelsea match he has settled into the number 8 shirt in the Wolves side and is one reason for their recent improvement.

Although Ken is still only 19, he was a reserve for Englands Under-23 side in their recent match against Wales, which is a good start in completing his ambition of playing for England.

Ken, who is the younger brother of Leeds United star, Terry Hibbitt, says that the biggest influence on his career was his late father, and he has always been a great admirer of Everton's midfield dynamo, Alan Ball.
