Things might change on that score when members realise how readily the new Wolves agreed to come down to London. The new Wolves really do appreciate you - the supporter - now that the "Doog" and his merry men are in charge. I'm sure the Club would lay out the red carpet for every supporter on matchdays if it was really possible. Long may it continue.

Results just lately have gone against us but we're still up with the leaders which is where it counts at this stage. The start to the season was tremendous and we have to return to that sort of form to ensure promotion at the first attempt.

We all agree that Gordon Smith is the missing link at present and the sooner he can return to the side the better. Surely no Wolves player has become so indispensable so quickly.

Perhaps the now sacked Joe Gallagher could take a leaf out of Gordon's book as regards giving 100% to his club.

Finally back to a happier note, we welcome Alan Dodd from Stoke. And John Richards assures us that he still intends to finish his career at Molineux and the loan to Derby is not a permanent move. Great!

GRAHAM HAWKINS

Our biggest problem at the moment is that we're short on experience - a lot of our players are only just out of school, in fact.

But the kids who've turned out have done remarkably well. Remember, David Wintersgill for example is only 16 years of age, and John Pender is only 18.

Yes, we've a lot of young, untried talent at the Club and they are all under pressure to keep up the good work. It's not only physical though, there is a mental pressure too. They have to keep up the good work right through the week, not just on a Saturday.

It isn't often that you see an 18 year old lad like John Pender getting into a team and staying there. These kids hit a peak and then fade a little and it's then that they must be rested.

John partly lost the edge on his game but after a few weeks out of the side he will have recharged his batteries, as it were. Then he'll be brought back and be a better player for it.

We rely a lot on the youngsters because transfers are almost non-existent as money is short these days. Only swap deals or free transfers are likely at present. Talking of which, John Richards' move to Derby County is purely in order to motivate John by giving him match practice at a higher level than the reserve team football he has been playing since returning from injury.

I spoke of free transfers - I was very pleased that we managed to sign Gordon Smith. He is a class player, but unfortunately pulled a muscle against Leicester and is currently injured.

Results-wise, I'm not happy that in our last two away games we've conceded six goals - five against us from set-pieces.

At Cambridge we were the better side for the first half-hour, then they scored from a free-kick at which we should have defended better. In the second half it was even-stevens but we fell down again from another free-kick. Having said that, we had several good chances and should have converted them.

After the defeat at Oldham, I read that Joe Royle thought we were the best Second Division team he'd seen this season. Well Joe, I think we could have played better - it was bad defending which again let us down.

In general, I'm very pleased with the way things have gone this season. We've had one or two injuries, but we've had some good results.

Obviously, I'd like us to be top of the division, but we are still very much within striking distance. I know the players are disappointed with recent results but the dressing-room's not a morgue. We have a laugh and a joke. I know I'm enjoying the season so far and I'm sure the players are too.

It's a long time since I wrote to my readers, so I'm here to remedy this.

In the recent newsletter you commented on the W.W.L.S.C.'s impecunious

position and I've had an idea as to how we can cut expenses.

Colin Whiting invariably sends me the monthly pontoon tickets by first class post costing $15\frac{1}{2}p$. If he were to send them by second class post he would save 3p per letter. On the assumption that he sends tickets to two hundred people (approximately half the club members, but I hope it's more than that) then he spends £6 per month which is £72 per annum in unnecessary expenditure.

No introduction whatsoever is needed for the incomparable "Doog". Now very much a hero at Molineux (when wasn't he?) being Club Chairman and Chief Executive, and he remains the W.W.L.S.C. Honorary President of which we are extremely proud.

For the benefit of our younger members, Derek's career record in brief is as follows: Joined Portsmouth in 1957; Blackburn Rovers, 1959; Aston Villa, 1961; Peterborough United, 1963; Leicester City, 1965; then came to Molineux in March 1967 for a fee of only £50,000.

Derek retired at the end of the 1974-75 season having totalled 532 (+ 14 as substitute) League appearances for his clubs and having netted 222 League qoals - more than any other Irishman.

As a Northern Ireland international he won 43 caps between 1958 and 1973 and his one "honour" won at Molineux was in helping Wolves to win the 1974 League Cup Final at Wembley.

Whilst at Wolves he was the P.F.A.'s Chairman and after his playing career had ended became manager at Kettering Town, then of the Southern League. For the last couple of seasons Derek has appeared as "front-man" for Yorkshire T.V.'s soccer programmes and has also found time to continue as the author of numerous books, not least his latest "How Not To Run Football".

Now, of course, Mr. Derek Dougan is supremo at the greatest club in the land - surely a fulfilled ambition. And what a reception at that first game:

"The former Molineux idol was given an incredible welcome at the Blackburn fixture. It was just like the coming of the Messiah and after Wolves' saviour had addressed his faithful worshippers and re-assured them that a prosperous future lay ahead, he joined the congregation massed on the North and South Banks to watch the game - when was the last time a football club chairman did that?"

There's a new look about the officials at Molineux and they are as follows: President remains as John Ireland, Douglas Hope is Vice-Chairman, and other directors are Mike Rowlands - Managing Director of Allied Properties Ltd. - John Starkey, Wilbur J. Smith Jnr., and Roger Hipkiss. The General Manager at the club is Eric Woodward whilst Company Secretary is Roger Loveland, the club's financial advisor is Stewart Ross and Peter Redfern has been promoted to Club Secretary (more about Peter elsewhere in this issue of "London Wolves").

New names and new faces for all of us. "London Wolves" wish them all the very best luck at the dawning of this new era.

The "new" football club at Molineux both on the pitch and behind the scenes has got off to a good start and we all hope it continues. The "new" Wolves don't seem to have stopped "doing" and "talking" yet. It's the like of which we've never seen before and it's great!

Wolves 2, Blackburn Rovers 1. Sat. 28th August 1982. Att: 15,605.

A perfect start for Molineux's new regime. The scen was all set for a celebration after the pre-match introduction of the new men at the helm.

Wolves were forced by injuries to give 16 year old midfielder David Wintersgill and Striker Billy Livingstone, 18, their debuts and had John Burridge making his first appearance between the sticks as a result of Bradshaw's long-term back problem, and another untried cub, winger Paul Butler, on the bench. Wintersgill became the second youngest player, after Jimmy Mullen, to have played for Wolves in a competitive

The "new" Wolves made a bright start, having early chances but not making them count. Blackburn soon began to threaten and after Palmer had cleared for a corner after the first 20 minutes, Stonehouse flicked the ball on at the near post for GARNER running in behind to head home from close in, giving Blackburn a 23rd minute opener.

The leveller came soon after the second half had started, with the ball being switched from left to right giving Daniel the chance to cross to the far post where the unmarked EVES had a simple task to head down into the net. Three minutes later, Wolves scrambled away a Blackburn attack, then Garner fired wide.

With a quarter of an hour left, Butler came on to make his first team bow, replacing Livingstone, and within two minutes he had set up the winner. His superb cross found EVES at the far post and he made no mistake with his header. What a magic moment that must have been for young Butler.

Neither set of players showed much inclination to attack in this rather sterile affair and it wasn't the sort of game to tempt back soccer's missing millions.

Chelsea's new signing, the veteran "Pop" Robson, the much travelled striker made no impact and the only Chelsea player to cause Wolves any problems was - through his sheer physical size - Micky Droy, when he went up for corners and free-kicks.

Former Aston Villa and Spurs utility player Gordon Smith, on a month's trial, was the Wolves substitute and in replacing Wintersgill early in the second half became the fifth player in two games to make his Wolves debut. Early on, Clarke headed onto the bar, Coy shot narrowly wide and Eves hammered in a 20-yarder which 'keeper Francis touched over. At the other end, Chivers unleashed a shot which Burridge smothered. In the second half, Chelsea did most of the attacking with a Droy header just wide and Walker's shot only inches away. Burridge came out, missed his punch and Matthews headed to safety, then Droy again went close as his powerful header was tipped over by Burridge. Then in the dying seconds, Droy headed into the penalty area, but Burridge saved Nutton's header and made sure of a useful point for Wolves.

Wolves set out from the start to take home a point and to their credit, they achieved that objective. There was early pressure from the home side, despite an Eves shot being saved by Lukic when Wolves broke.

Worthington was offside when he netted, then Burridge made an excellent tipover save as Butterworth headed in Graham's cross. Clarke headed over for Wolves just before the break, and in the second period Worthington nearly got on the end of a good pass but Humphrey booted away for a corner. Again on the break, Andy Gray, back from suspension and playing with his broken arm strapped, had an effort which was just too high.

There was a real let-off when Butterworth and Frank Gray combined well to set up Worthington with ample time and space, but under pressure from the advancing Burridge he lost control and the Wolves defence tidied up. With 20 minutes to go Wolves had their golden chance when Matthews' cross was laid off by Smith to Clarke, but under pressure he stabbed his shot wide. That proved to be Wolves' last chance and the last action of a disappointing game.

The good start continues with this resounding win over poor Charlton. Wolves were soon in front with EVES giving us an 8th minute lead. Daniel's corner found Clarke whose header looped up high off a defender and looked to be going out of play until Bob Coy nodded it back into the middle for Mel to score from 6 yards.

Three minutes before the break, Wolves scored again with a text-book goal. Daniel's corner was perfect for GRAY to rise high and power home a bullet header. Gray collected a knock on his ankle, played on until half-time, but as the teams ran out for the second half gray pulled up sharply and was replaced by Paul Butler at the earliest opportunity. Butler was soon in action, sending over a long cross that Walker needlessly handled presenting PALMER with the chance to blast home the penalty-kick in typical blockbusting style. The game was now won and Charlton were allowed to come back a little, Walker wasting a good chance.

Wolves came strongly again at the end. Eves crossed for Clarke to head wide, then Butler crossed for CLARKE who this time scored with his header. With four minutes left, MATTHEWS beat 'keeper Johns to make it a nap hand, and sadly to complete Charlton's night of misery, McAllister was stretchered off in the dying seconds.

Wolves' patience was rewarded against this Barnsley side, who did everything to make life difficult, with two second-half goals. The Reds denied Wolves space, played the ball around and their attacks caused Wolves a few problems.

An early Livingstone cross was headed down and Horn in the Barnsley goal fumbled the ball before it was scrambled away. An Eves attack broke down when Palmer shot well wide, but then sent a lovely 60-yard crossfield ball to Smith. He nodded down to Clarke who turned well, but his shot was off target.

On the hour, Livingstone broke through and headed for goal, then veered out to the left and sent in a fierce shot which Horn pushed out and HUMPHREY, following up, blasted it home to put Wolves in front.

Matthews blasted a shot over the bar when he should have passed to Smith, but after 66 minutes Wolves were 2-0 up. Palmer picked up a clearance, moved forward, played a one-two with Clarke and nodded the return pass to EVES. Mel looked to be offside, but he brushed aside Palmer, and with most people expecting a linesman's flag, took charge of the situation and beat Horn as he advanced from goal.

Former wolf, Alan Birch, missed scoring a consolation goal for Barnsley at the end, but his shot was too high.

A goal just six minutes from time - a fine solo effort from Billy Livingstone - gave Wolves a win they scarcely deserved and certainly didn't look like gaining. LIVINGSTONE picked up the ball from a Wolves throw—in on the right, squeezed between two defenders as they came across to meet him, ran square across the edge of the 18-yard box, then unleashed a low shot which just crept inside 'keeper McDonough's left-hand post. A moment of inspiration from the Wolves youngster, but rather out of context with the rest of this appalling game.

But Livingstone had been unlucky not to have given Wolves the lead as early as the second minute when he won possession on the right, beat two men and fired in a shot which the 'keeper just touched into the side netting. For the first half-hour Wolves were on top, but really the game never got going. As they lost some control Burridge saved a curling shot from Chandler, Bolton's most dangerous man.

A twenty-yard shot from Smith troubled Bolton and at the other end Burridge saved at Doyle's feet. Matthews and Clarke went close with volleys, and then a Smith header to Livingstone was turned only inches wide. But enough was enough and Livingstone claimed the points

This 2-O victory not only made it an uncomfortable return to Molineux for Emlyn Hughes but extended Wolves' unbeaten start to seven games, maintained the 100% Molineux record and made it 608 minutes since a goal had been conceded.

Inside the first minute Ronnie Moore had almost given the Reds the lead, but two minutes later it was the visitors who were shocked when a high cross came over from the left and though Daniel mis-hit his shot, CLARKE stuck out a foot to divert the bobbling ball high into the net.

Rotherham hit back with McBride's shot into the side netting and Hughes shooting at Burridge from a 30-yard free-kick. Daniel was booked for dissent after the referee had penalised Palmer, and after the break Rotherham made every effort to get back on terms.

But Wolves broke out to score the decisive second after 68 minutes. John Humphrey charged through the middle, fed Eves on his right, Mel tried an angled chip which floated across goal to Clarke and he nodded the ball back into the penalty area where HUMPHREY edged Wolves towards victory "by a nose" virtually as he lay on the ground.

Wolves should really have increased their goal tally with Eves and Livingstone both missing good chances, but victory was again Wolves'.

After only four minutes, Livingstone on the left hoisted a long and seemingly harmless cross into the Carlisle box, but Swinburne was slow to come out of his goal and SMITH nipped in to head past the now stranded 'keeper.

Poskett replied by hitting the outside of a post with a swerving volley and then set up a low cross for Bannon who let it go. Then Wolves went two up after 35 minutes. Humphrey carried the ball out of defence, floated a pass to Eves who nodded down for Clarke. Wayne ran forward and chipped beautifully over Swinburne only to see his effort hit the underside of the bar and bounce out. In the second half, Wolves sat back facing some stern pressure, especially when Staniforth headed against the foot of a post before John Humphrey booted clear. Shoulder shot wide late on, and Carlisle's last hope had vanished.

Wolves matched their Division 1 opponents and twice Turner foiled Eves with world-class saves, and twelve minutes from time Gordon Smith's lob rebounded from the crossbar amidst a frantic scramble in front of the visitors' goal.

Sunderland took the lead in the 7th minute when Palmer brought down Rowell as he ran onto McCoist's through ball and ROWELL himself drove home the penalty – the first goal Wolves had conceded since the opening day of the season. Just before the break and after Eves' headers had been stopped brilliantly by Turner, Wolves levelled the score from a free-kick given for pushing. Humphrey took the kick and crossed with pin-point accuracy for EVES to rise and head home.

Both sides kept battling away in the second half, but it was Hindmarch who almost won it for Wolves as he turned a Butler cross towards his own goal, but Turner once again saved.

In the end, the Wolves defence came out on top and 'keeper John Burridge was the hero, making two outstanding saves from Wednesday's Gary Bannister to keep his amazing record intact – eight successive league clean sheets and more than 13 hours without letting in a league goal!

Eves, on the other hand, was presented with a back-pass from Bannister, but as Mel tried to centre for Livingstone he only succeeded in chipping the ball into Bolder's arms.

Wednesday should have scored ten minutes from time when Mick Lyons dived full-length for a header but put it wide, and then in the dying seconds Hibbitt - back from a US summer with Seattle Sounders - swerved a shot just off target.
