

In the twentieth minute, Bully sent a neat glancing header out to Kevin Muscat on the wing, and his fine cross to the near post, found Robbie Keane, whose shot on the turn was parried by Rovers keeper Simonsen, but Keane reacted fastest of the pack, to rifle the rebound into the net.

Wolves continued to control the game, and should have been further ahead by the half time interval.

A Fine Scalp for Barnet



In a match which they were expected to win, Wolves strolled about the pitch as if they could do so at leisure, with Robbie Keane showing some exciting touches.

A host of watching managers saw Keane go close on three occasions in the first half, including a disallowed chip shot from the edge of the area, cancelled out for off-side, and the sides entered the break all square.

Robert Sawyer was causing the Wolves' defence some problems with his long throws, and it was from one of these in the sixty eighth minute, that Mike Stowell going to collect the ball at his right-hand post, flapped and missed, allowing Scott McGleish to stoop low and head into an empty net.

Wolves upped the pace over the next few attacks, and in the seventy-seventh minute Simon Osborn curled a shot from the left hand side of the penalty area, which deceived everyone, and flew into the far corner of the Barnet goal.

Seemingly content to bring the teams back to Molineux on level terms, Wolves relaxed, only to find that Barnet were not content to let matters rest there, and with only seconds left of this cup-tie, McGleish released Darren Currie, nephew of former England star Tony, and he crashed an unstoppable right foot shot into the top left hand corner of Stowell's goal.

On the stroke of half-time, Bully, challenging the Oxford 'keeper in mid-air, caused Whitehead to drop the ball from Kevin Muscat's cross, and turning the fastest, toe poked the ball into the net.

Fernando Gomez, making his Wolves' debut in mid-field, impressed with some neat touches and aggressive challenges, something which Wolves have been sadly lacking, and looking as if he will be a valuable asset to the side.

Bully trims Barnet



C teve Bull equalled John Richards' Drecord of eighteen goals for Wolves in the League Cup, by scoring his first hattrick for over seven years. With a deficit of one goal to pull back from the first leg, Wolves roared into a three goal half-time lead, with Bully scoring twice and Robbie Keane once. His first was when he picked up a pass from Lee Naylor, passed wide to Keane, and then dived to head home in the 15th minute. He added a second in the 36th minute when chesting down a Fernando Gomez centre and smashing a rising half-volley into the net. Almost on the stroke of half-time, Robbie Keane collected a Bull header from a Lee Naylor free-kick and, unmarked, shot past keeper Harrison to secure a two goal cushion between the teams at half-time.

The two in-form strikers each got on the scoresheet again in the second half, with Bull supplying a flicked pass to Keane in the 75th minute, the young forward then sold the keeper a dummy before flicking an audacious chip shot over him.

Bully then completed the rout four minutes later powering a header into the net from Steve Froggatt's corner, and promptly left the field to a standing ovation. This was the 18th hat-trick of Bully's career, and this performance showed just how hard he had worked at his fitness.



Five minutes later, however, Wolves were in the lead when Osborn's corner was cleared as far as Froggatt, who delivered a cheeky chipped ball onto the bar, and Dean Richards smashed the rebound home.

Once again, Osborn was involved in the second goal, and what a beauty it was. AGM Report

The Club's Annual General Meeting was held at the Mason's Arms pub on 22nd July 1998. The Chairman, Stuart Earl, welcomed all those present and immediately apologised for the spasmodic production of the magazine. He also apologised for the cancellation of the Dinner Dance at which we had organised for the members to meet the players after the QPR game. This cancellation was due to the team playing Arsenal the next day in the FA Cup semi-final. It was sad to add to the loss that day that we also subsequently had to forfeit our deposit for the cancellation of the hotel booking.

The minutes of the previous AGM could not be read out as the previous Minutes Secretary had resigned and not passed the information on. Stuart attempted to recall as much as possible about them from memory, but failed miserably!

Regarding membership, Dave Slape reported that our numbers stood at 271. The members had overwhelmingly voted Keith Curle their Player of the Year, with Robbie Keane and Mike Stowell coming second and third respectively. Dave thanked Peter Woodifield and Jim Heath for their kind donations of prizes for the raffle. The meeting thanked Dave for his hard work throughout the year.

The Club's finances were generally sound, although there was a loss of £928.87 on the year. This loss was due, in the main, to the Dinner Dance and the season tickets. To save money this year, the Club would purchase less season tickets, although this matter was to be referred to the Committee at their next meeting. The Club were in the process of going on the Official Supporters Club internet. There were no long term debts from members and upon conclusion of Dave Hodges' report, the Chairman asked for a vote of thanks from the floor for Dave's sterling work in keeping our finances in good order.

Tim Richards, the social Secretary, explained in his report that the £350.00 deposit for the Dinner Dance was unfortunately lost because the booking for the event had been made 6 months previously and the hotel could not find a replacement at short notice. We are again hoping to promote a similar function to coincide with our game against QPR on 6th March 1999. The matter of more pub nights was mentioned from the floor this will be looked into.

Peter Woodifield, the Travel Secretary, reported on his efforts of finding tickets for all those waiting to go to matches. He had arranged trips to all matches but one and because of losses on some tickets, there were no subsidised trips. Everybody who travelled REGULARLY to matches received a ticket for the FA Cup semi-final. Only 8 season tickets have been purchased for the coming season and hopefully we should still be able to

obtain 13 Away season tickets, Peter singled out "James" in the ticket office for all his help. The meeting wholeheartly thanked Peter for his hard work.

John Engleman reported on the magazine, explaining that whilst the quality of the issues had greatly improved, attempts at streamlining it's production in order to reduce costs, was proving problematical but not insurmountable. A plea was made for more members input into the magazine.

The election of offices for the coming year saw the existing Committee voted in en-masse with Leo Masters taking over from Michael Jacobs as minutes Secretary. Membership fees for the coming year were frozen at last years levels. The meeting closed for the partaking of further liquid refreshment at 21.35.
