Rugby's great for Wolves

ur journey to Wolverhampton for the Watford game was certainly eventful. 

Man Utd have been ordered by a Football League Appeals Committee to pay Wolves £200,000 immediately as compensation for the signing of youth player Nardiello. Daniel Wolves will be entitled to further payments of £150,000-a-time Nardiello goes on to play 5, 15, 25 and 40 first-team matches, and a further £250,000 will be payable if he plays in a UEFA/ FTFA competitive international fixture.

Colin Lee is set to offer contracts to on loan Epesse Titi and Scott Leitch. Kevin Muscat is the new Wolves captain. Simon Osborn is made Club Skipper, and he will head a players' committee that also includes Mike Stowell, Andy Sinton and Paul Simpson.

George Ndah will return to full training this week after fears that he could be sidelined for the start of the season. Ndah returned early from Wolves' preseason trip to Ireland complaining of discomfort in his knee.

Sheffield Wednesday midfielder Danny Sonner, available on a Bosman free transfer, is having talks with Wolves about a possible move to Molineux.

26th.Wolves 0 Coventry1. Robbie Keane scores Coventry's winner.

27th. Akinbiyi completes move to Leicester.

30th. Wolves lose 2-0 to Aston Villa in Mike Stowell's testimonial match.

AUGUST

1st. Wolves have signed French defenders Epesse Titi and Mohamed Camara. Epesse Titi has joined as a free agent from Bordeaux, while Camara joins on a four-month loan from Le Havre.


Adam Proudlock has joined Scottish First Division outfit Clyde in a three-month loan deal. Robert Niestroj has joined Greek club Iraklis, on a 5 month loan, with a view to a permanent move.

3rd. Saudi Arabian international striker, Sami Al-Jaber is on trial at Wolves with a view to a possible permanent deal. Al-Jaber will play in Saturday's friendly versus Southampton, along with another trialist, Cyril Eboki Poh from Bastia. Colin Lee is also being linked with a move for Bradford's Robbie Blake.

Wolves beat Leicester 2-0 behind closed doors, Sami Al-Jaber and Cyril Eboki Poh both feature in the game. Scorers are Eboki Poh and Colin Larkin.

Danny Sonner rejects a move to Wolves, and signs for Birmingham.

4th. Wolves sign Temuri Ketsbaia for £900,000, subject to a medical and work permit being obtained.

5th Wolves 1 S'ton 2. Wolves scorer is Andy Sinton. Sami Al-Jaber impresses.

Adam Proudlock gets a hat-trick on his Clyde debut against Falkirk.

9th. Wolves have opened talks with Saudi Arabian club Al-Hilal about signing Sami Al-Jaber but have been warned they will have to spend £2 million if they want to sign him.

10th. Colin Lee is scouring the market again for a goalkeeper, amid fears that Mike Stowell could be facing another long spell on the sidelines.

11th. Man City accept Wolves bid of £1.6 million for striker Robert Taylor, with Portsmouth also said to have had a similar bid accepted. Wolves sign ex-Swindon keeper Frank Talia on a month's loan, with doubts about Mike Stowell's fitness. Paul Simpson's contract is cancelled by mutual consent, and he signs for Blackpool.

14th. Colin Lee has agreed a one year extension to his contract along with John Ward and Terry Connor.

15th. Man City striker Robert Taylor agrees to join Wolves on a four year contract. The fee is £1.55 million.

17th. Adam Proudlock is rewarded with a new extended contract.

18th. Wolves bid of £600,000 for midfielder Tony Dinning, is turned down by Stockport.

19th. Ludo Pollet is missing from the Stockport team and will be out of action for about 6 weeks, as he needs a hernia operation. Michael Branch is also injured and out of the team.

21st. Neil Emblen signs a new three year contract.

signs for Wolves as the first English import from Saudi Arabia. The Saudi Football Federation have to give approval, and a work permit has to be secured, Al-Jaber is costing £1.3m in a transfer that includes an initial fivemonth loan and two exhibition matches to be played by Wolves in Riyadh.

23rd. Lee Naylor named in England U21 squad for friendly v Georgia at Middlesbrough on 31st August.

25th. Wolves sign lps-

wich defender Manuel Thetis on a month's loan.

SEPTEMBER

5th.Wolves want to take Arsenal's young striker Jermaine Pennant on Ioan. Adam Proudlock makes a scoring debut for Wolves at Oxford, after being recalled Molineux from his loan spell at Clyde. He has also signed a new threeyear contract.

9th. ScottTaylor, taken off with a serious knee injury against Tranmere, is likely to be out of action for several months. Kevin Muscat sent-off in the match, is banned for one match.

12th. Simon Osborn, making his first start in six games versus Sheffield Utd, sustains a hamstring injury, which will keep him out of action for a month. Robert Taylor also sustains a calf strain.

15th, Former Managing Director John Richards, has resigned his position

as a member of the board. The resignation was accepted by the board with immediate effect.

Norwich have beaten Wolves for the signature of Leicester defender Steve Walsh.

Joleon Lescott signs a new four year contract with the club. Wolves will be without Steve Sedgley at Wimbledon. Sedgley joins Wolves mounting injury list, after suffering a recurrence of a knee injury, and Temuri Ketsbaia is rated doubtful after tweaking his hamstring in midweek.

16th. The highly rated midfielder Tony Dinning is set to join Wolves after the club agrees a £700,000 deal with Stockport.

21st. Tony Dinning completes his move to Molineux, and is expected to make his debut in Sunday's match versus Norwich. Wolves sack stadium manager Clive Mountford, after an internal investigation.

26th, Colin Lee is still keeping a close eye on a top European transfer target, but will not reveal who he is.

German defender Karsten Baumann has returned to Borussia Dortmund after failing to get international clearance to play in the reserves.

Colin Lee has revealed Michael Oakes was rested against Grimsby, and not dropped as some reports suggested.

28th. Wolves could lose Sami Al-Jaber for a month as he has been called up by Saudi Arabia for the Asia Cup in Lebanon. If Saudi Arabia reach the final of the competition, Al-Jaber will be away from Molineux until the end of October.

OCTOBER

2nd.George Ndah is to see a specialist this week as he bids to try and get back to full fitness.

3rd. Ludovic Pollet makes his comeback from injury with a 45 minute appearance for the reserves at Stockport.

Wolves have rearranged the home match v Grimsby for November

4th. Wolves have been told they will have to spend £1.5 million if they want to sign Andrejs Rubins.

8th. Press reports link Wolves with a move for Sunderland defender Paul Butler.

9th. Ludo Pollet is sent off in the reserves match versus Burnley. Simon Osborn makes a successful comeback in the same match. French trialist David Bettoni also plays, and impresses after appearing as a late substitute.

11th. Ludo Pollet could be fit to face Bolton on Saturday, despite missing vital match practice after being sent off.

Ryan Green has joined Wolves' injury list after picking up an injury in Wales U21's 2-1 defeat in Poland.

12th. Steve Sedgley is likely to be out of action for up to three months after undergoing knee surgery.

13th. Blackburn defender Darren Peacock is signed on a month's loan. Men like Cullis should never be forgotten

THE oldest living England football captain, the man responsible for sparking the creation of the European Cup, celebrates his 84th birthday today. Stan Cullis, sadly, will hardly understand the importance. He suffers from a form of dementia, his health a victim of another era when football was played with heavy, sodden leather balls, with little understanding of the consequences.

He is among the many neglected heroes of English football, men whose fate the game cruelly casts aside in feverish search for the new. But today it is surely worth pausing to salute a giant of football, the Iron Manager who won three titles and two FA Cups for his mighty Wolves in the Fifties. When they beat Honved, the incomparable Ferenc Puskas and all, in a friendly in 1954, Cullis said: "There they are; the champions of the world." It was an extravagant claim and one which infuriated the great clubs of the Continent such as Real Madrid, provoking them into the immediate creation of the European Cup.

The first English side to play in it were Manchester United, and their first match was at Anderlecht. What a quirk of fate it is that last night United were again playing Anderlecht in the competition on the eve of Cullis's birthday. Football has altered so much over 35 years. But one essential element is unchanged, the importance of a good manager. Sir Alex Ferguson proves that at United, a club he runs with the same fierce authority that Cullis employed. Once, Cullis took a player back on to the pitch after a game. The ground was dark but he walked the lad around for many minutes, saying "Now show me where this hole is you've been hiding in all day."

England's current quest for a new coach, with the Football Association setting out the list of qualities its Mr Perfect must have, is another illustration. The FA says it wants "integrity", sustained success at the highest level and the ability "to focus solely on the job". Years ago that would have been Cullis to a tee: The muscular Christian who never swore, who won every trophy going, the

Farewell to a Molineux legend

A worthy tribute to Steve Bull

It was little more than a flippant, off-the-cuff remark. The Express & Star were sending me to the 1990 World Cup in Italy and, with the town then bursting with pride at Bully's inclusion in Bobby Robson's twenty two, wouldn't it be a good idea to invite folk to send in their best wishes eards for me to take out? Great idea, said the then Sports Editor Brian Clifford, before warning that hundreds would respond. Rubbish, I said, we'd do well to get 40 or 50. In the event we were both wrong. We got thousands. Great, bulging bag loads of the stuff that I then had to hawk across Italy with me, to feed to the Great Man in manageable batches of 20 or 25. There were letters and eards from men and women of all ages, but the most memorable messages were sent by the kids. Hours

had been spent painting pictures of their hero; entire classes had signed their names; it had become a labour of love.

I guess those children are in their late teens now, a little more cynical about the world and even about Wolves. But not about Bully. He has remained an enduring source of immense pride for anyone who passed through the Molineux turnstiles even as his magical powers began to wane under the strain of those creaking hamstrings and swollen knees. The two huge sports bags I ferried around England's training sessions to bring to Bully became, I think, a source of some embarrassment to him. Not because of their contents, you understand,


but because of the mickey-taking it ignited from his fellow England internationals. He was, after all, the one member of England's World Cup group from outside the old First Division.

He was the rough out, the backstreet international, eventually after England's faltering start, the people's champion. Shilton, Lineker, Butcher, even Gascoigne could be out there warming up but when Bully made that unmistakeable, elbow pumping sprint on to the pitch, even the non Wolverhampton England fans began that familiar "Oo-Bully, Bully, Oo-Bully, Bully" chant. One day, when I sat down to hand over yet another batch of cards, the England sweeper Mark Wright walked past us and minmicked that very chant. Bully suspected - perhaps wrongly - that there was a measure of resentment among the millionaires around him, that this rough diamond with the impenetrable Black Country accent, could be so instantly popular.

The rumour from that World Cup that has passed into football mythology, is that Bull even dotted Lineker on the nose when the mickey-taking finally became too much. It was a rumour that has never been substantiated



and Bull has frequently denied. And yet it was possible to detect a distance between Bully and the rest of the party. While his room-mate and only other fellow West Midlands based player, David Platt, clearly had his heart set on joining football's aristocracy, Bully was never at ease with what he frequently called the "golf and gin and tonic set".



The summer of 1990 will live forever in my memory and Bully's. Italy was vibrant with the World Cup, bursting with excitement and colour, and noisy instant parades every time the host nation played. There, in the thick of this richly layered carnival of so many different football cultures, was the uncomplicated, destructive goal scorer that was Steve Bull, fresh from the humble origins of the old Fourth Division barely three years earlier. It was a mighty achievement which deserved every one of the messages I dragged around with me. During that unforgettable summer. I too came to feel the hairs on the back of my neck stand up whenever Bully was in full cry, and I'm not a Welves fan by birth. God knows the effect he had on you.

"God. I wish you were all still playing" said Sir Jack to a room full of ex-Wolves greats. The following day at Crewe it appeared that he had been taken at his word and that Wolves had fielded a team of pensioners. But back to the night before....

London Wolves are the first ever supporters group to be offered a table at the Former Players Association Annual Dinner. Almost every living Wolves legend was there. All the former players (plus a few guests from other league clubs) were called into the room one by one as their list of achievements were read out. Bill Slater...Bert Williams...John Richards...Steve Bull... the list went on. The setting was the Hayward Suite at Molineux and the guest of henour none other than Sir Jack accompanied by our new Chief Exec, Jez Moxey, Rachael Heyhoe-Flint and Michael Lister (he's a Director!).

Surprisingly good food accompanied by dreadful wine, (admittedly supplied free by Halfpenny Green Vineyard) put us all in a good mood before the speeches. Bill Slater was first and easily the best, reminiseing on the Stan Cullis era and his unique style of management. Dennis Mortimer (ex-Villa) proved to be the "villain" of the peace, boring us all rigid: West Brom against Villa is apparently the Midland's biggest derby?!? He also questioned why everybody hates Villa. It was tempting to tell him. After he had finished and those weaker souls

who had been sheltering in the toilets returned to their seats, Phil Parkes spoke briefly about the Wolves/West Brom Derby of 1969. To the great disappointment of the room he decided to sit down abruptly and in mid speech after recalling how he uttered, "Take that you bastard" as he thumped Tony Brown. Phil, along with members of London Wolves, was the last guest to leave the room some three hours later!

The main speech of the night was left to Sir Jack. Whatever you think of the state of Wolves and whether a demen or angel, he is an engaging and passionate speaker. It was, perhaps, unfortunate that the main content of his speech was to announce that a statue was to be creeted in honour of Stan Cullis. A very admirable and deserved accolade, but perhaps symptomatic of the problems at Molinuex. Rather than worrying about the present (three wins out of 16 league games being relegation form) the focus is again on the glorious past.

Our Chairman Stuart Earl had the sort of luck with the raffle that opposition forwards usually have with Wolves' defence and won two prizes, a video and bottle of Scotch. The latter did not last long.


Privately several of the former players who still follow the club expressed disappointment at the lack of desire of the current players. Who can argue?

The first half saw Burnley keeper Crichton make no saves from a Wolves side who showed a complete inability to put together an a tacking move. In fact such was the performance that it bare no resemblance to the mediocre games against Sheffield and Stockport.
