Ex-Wolf Goodman was injured early on, tangling with Mussie, and took no further part but even his spirit would not have been enough to stop a very good performance from the visitors.

NEWTON CUTS UP FOREST

WOLVES 1-0 NOTT'M FOREST 25th September 2001

Forest came for a point, It was as simple as that, but with only seconds remaining, Newton popped up at the far post, to rifle home a header from Kennedy's' cross.

Wolves had dominated throughout, and had severely tested Forest keeper Ward, with Blake going close twice in the first half.

First he headed a cross from Museat straight at the keeper, and then he blasted a long-range effort, which Ward did well to cope with.

There was a "bit of a do" late in the second period, when Newton tried to exact revenge for an earlier tackle, and upwards of a dozen players were involve in a handbags episode.

Diving to his left, the Wolves' keeper turned a fierce shot around the post, and from the ensuing corner, the ball was moved rapidly up to the other end, where Proudlock was left to tap in after fine work from Newton.

In the second half, Wolves were put under pressure from the off, but always looked dangerous on the break, and only a fine save from Walsh prevented Blake from increasing the lead.

TRAVEL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Trips were run to all home League & Cup matches, and pre-season friendlies. Also to 17 away matches.

Highest attended were: Home: Barnsley 58, Blackburn 53 Forest 51

Away: Sheff W 44, Port Vale 35, Wigan 33

Average no travelling: Sat/Sun/BH home:42

Midweek home: 15 Sat/Sun/BH away: 25 Midweek away: 20

Profit was £1008:20, & 45 members qualified for subsidised trip, and a possibility of a subsidised trip early next season.

Fares for new season not yet available, & busy services may cost more than less used trains.

Two members owe £42 on match tickets & reminders have been sent. Monies still owed from 97/98. £51 still owed by two people who will not have membership renewed until debts settled. £28 still owed by people who we have lost contact with.

Club made profit of £471 on seven club season tickets. Member D Archer allowed use of personal ticket when not in use, and thanks are expressed. Tickets were again used to purchase tickets for away matches.

12 available away season tickets, and unused voucher resulted in a refund to the member.

Match day prices to rise for the new season, but season ticket prices to be decreased with no cup matches included in the price.

Thanks are expressed to Wolves' ticket office staff, particularly James & Adam, in meeting all our requests for tickets. Thanks also to Dave Slape, Bob Richards and Jamie Eldridge for their assistance during the season.

Members should be aware that Virgin is NOT accepting unused tickets this season, therefore any member booking a ticket will be liable to pay for the trip. This also applies to match tickets which remain unsold.

Members must ensure that any future delayed trip tickets are returned to Travel Sec for appropriate refund to be obtained on their behalf.

A LOAD OF BULL!

Someone told me "you'll like going to Preston, there's a lot of pubs on the way from the station to the ground!" Well I counted at least a dozen, but I'm sure I missed a couple.

I must admit though, I did like going to Preston. However it wasn't for the pubs, but a great second half performance from the fast improving men in gold and black. (A couple of "Slap's posse" have said that I only write good things about the pubs "The Posse" drink in, well read on).

The omens were bad as soon as we tried to enter the first pub "The Railway." It looked shut, but "Woody" Woodifield knocked on the door, and was granted admission from the landlord, but as the rest of us tried to file in, the afore mentioned landlord was having none of it, "sorty lads home supporters only!" Geoff Newbound was dispatched to rescue Pete who was asked if there were many home supporters in there. "No, one man and his dog" was the reply.

The Posse walked up the high street passing a couple of unsavoury looking establishments en route, when we came across a pub that looked made for us, "The Old Bull."

There were a couple of heavies on the door, but they let us in with no problem.

From the outside the pub gave the appearance of an old fashioned pub, but deceptively, inside it was very modern with a large bar area and lots of tables.

I would think that they serve quite a few meals during the week, but this was Saturday lunchtime, and apart from Slaps Posse there were only a dozen or so locals in for their lunchtime sup.

Now onto the most important thing, the beer, (well lack of it), No real ale, no local wallop, only Theakstons or the old Jonny Smiths. Loads of lagers, Fosters, Stella, Millers etc., and a large selection of alcopops. (I got the impression that "The Old Bull" is the sort of pub where the young people of Preston meet up before they go clubbing

I have to admit that I wasn't enjoying my spell in the pub, the company was ok, but I was beginning to feel a little uneasy, but that said, the pub had a large screen with Sky Sports showing, a pool table and a table football game, and although not many of us were enjoying the place, we agreed to meet there after the match, and enquired from the doormen if we could get back in afterwards. "Yes lads, enjoy the game."

Well, I'm sorry to say that they were talking from somewhere else with a hole and not their mouths, because on returning we got "sorry lads you can't come in," the excuse being that some of us had trainers on. I don't suppose it was anything to do with the result was it?

Opposite was a pub called "The Coach Inn" and so we ended up in there

"The Coach Inn" is not a pub to get too exited about, done out in old mahogany and lots of seats, so that you can enjoy your pint in comfort.

Talking of pints, this is another pub that had no real ale. Perhaps the people of Preston don't drink real ale!

I would say that "The Coach Inn2 was not a football supporters pub, with not a lot to choose from, only Worthington, Carling or Guinness.
