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**We're no longer bottom of the league, we are still in touch with the mid-table teams, we have a couple of wins under our belts and several solid performances to revel in. Things are definitely looking up at Molineux.**

Coming back from 3-0 down at half-time against Leicester to win 4-3 will have proved to the players that letting your heads drop is not the response to going behind and that no match is over until the final whistle – anything can happen! Inside is a match review from a Leicester City fan of that game and I hope you enjoy it (and that it never ever happens to us).

The biggest news off the pitch, since the last issue, is that Sir Jack Haywood has decided to sell the club. This bombshell could have been timed more judiciously but, nevertheless, it's happened and we need to keep our fingers crossed that a rich consortium comes along and continues where Sir Jack leaves off. Many people have expressed their views on this decision in the media and all I want to add is a huge "THANK YOU" for what he has visibly done to the club and where his money has got us. I dread to think where we would be without his amazing contribution to the Wolves. Jez Moxey has recently declared that the chances of finding a "local" businessman to take over the reins is looking increasingly unlikely and that the net will be cast further afield in the hope of attracting a rich benefactor. As long as we avoid the possibility of another "Bhatti Brothers" scenario I'll be happy.

The injury list is still a major concern with Joleon Lescott having been forced to have another operation on his right knee. Initial reports indicate that this was successful and he could be playing by the end of January. George Ndah appears destined also to be out until January at the earliest and there is no word on when Matt Murray's back injury might see his return to action. Wolves have finally been granted permission to get emergency goalkeeper cover and Andy Marshall has been drafted in from Ipswich Town to provide that essential service.

We are still in the Carling Cup but probably not for much longer as we have drawn Arsenal away in the next round (see previous editorials for reasons for negativity here).

Jez Moxey has indicated that there will be money available to Dave Jones to spend

when the transfer window reopens in January but there is currently no indication of how much this will be.

There are, in my opinion, 5 winnable matches between now and then (Everton, Newcastle, Villa, Spurs and Leeds) and 15 points will see us very comfortably off the bottom of the table and sufficiently attractive to players who want to continue their Premiership careers.

Wolves were very unfortunate not to take maximum spoils in this enthralling local derby as Iversen, having his best match so far in a Wolves shirt, just failed to score in the final few seconds.

This after he had pulled Wolves level just after the hour to cancel out an early second half strike from Forssell.
