We would also include players that were in the squad that year, as well as other former players who we have also had the highest regard for. Again, as you already know, what a fantastic turn out it proved to be.

However, despite exhaustive efforts by the past players and some of our own Club members, we failed to snare one particular man that would have provided 'the icing on the cake' on our guest list. I quote these words because they are not mine; they are from the players who attended our 'Do'. That man, of course, was Peter Knowles.

Those of us who were privileged to actually be around at the time when Peter was strutting his stuff at Highbury, Anfield, Old Trafford, etc., have never forgotten what a great player he was. With no exaggeration, he was the first 'George Best'. A brilliant player, great goalscorer (look up his record), and destined for a marvellous England future. But it all came to a sudden end.

Because of his well-documented religious beliefs, Peter retired from football and never played again. Wolves held onto his registration in the hope that he would return. He never did. From the day he left the Wolves, to this day, he has been steadfast and true to his beliefs. Because of this I doubt if any supporters ever held any long-term grudges. We certainly didn't and that is why we tried every which way to get Peter to attend our anniversary bash.

Yes, I know, that what I'm about to say is in the wrong religious context, but I thought that if Mohammed won't come to the mountain, then the mountain will have to go to Mohammed. To this end. I found out where Peter was working in Wolverhampton and set off with Peter Woodifield and Phil O'Connor in tow to see him. And, boy, what a nice man he still is. As you can see from the photographs, its only the grey hair that makes him look different from the Peter Knowles of 40, yes 40, years ago. We chatted with him for some 10 minutes or so, and emphasised how we would have been privileged to have had him at our celebrations. His reply shook us a little. He said he didn't come because he'd have felt a fraud because of his actions 40 years ago!! We told him in no uncertain terms that he was wrong, so very wrong, to think that way.

During our chat he asked if the tall, slim, long-haired bloke in charge was still with us. We told him he was now the Chairman but apart from the description 'tall', he'd changed quite a bit!!!! Peter recalled that after playing in an evening game at Molineux, he'd seen three or four Wolves supporters standing at a bus stop in the early hours. With a few hours to go before the bus' 2.00am departure back to London, Peter insisted that they all come home with him back to his mum's house for some grub. With Peter's fiancé driving the small sports car, Dave Slape and Jeff Ball got in the back and Peter ended up sitting on Stuart's lap in the front!!

As time was pressing and we both had to go our separate ways, Peter wished the Supporters Club well for the future, apologised again for missing the 40th event, BUT did ask when the next one was! So, here's hoping that we have a 45th event and that we're more successful with our invitation to the legend that is Peter Knowles.

At 6-5 down, Craddock blazed the ball over the bar and that was that. A thoroughly miserable night, and an equally miserable drive home, leaving us to 'concentrate on the League.'

WOLVES 1-0 LUTON TOWN 26th August 2006



£100 000 signing Johnson proved to be the match winner for the second game running, as he led the Luton defence a merry dance, with his darting runs, and thoughtful use of the ball.

Wolves had most of the play during the first period, and Johnson could have done better with a volley after fourteen minutes, but alongside a rejuvenated Cort, caused a lot of problems which should have seen Wolves go into the break with the lead.

This situation was rectified before many had retaken their seats after half time, as Wolves caught the visitors cold. Receiving the ball outside the area, Johnson thundered a shot past Beresford to give Wolves a deserved lead

Murray gave the home fans a worry when he went off with a knee injury, but these were later shown to be unfounded. His deputy, Ikeme, proved up to the task as Luton pressed for an equaliser in the last fifteen minutes, watching drives from both Parkin and Edwards gong just wide.

STOKE POTTY TRAINED

WOLVES 2-0 STOKE CITY 23rd September 2006

Wolves got back to winning ways at home with a comfortable 2-0 win over their Midlands rivals Stoke City at Molineux. Stoke on a three game unbeaten away run were always second best following goals in either half from Clarke and Olofinjana which took Wolves up to sixth place in the table.

Stoke started the livelier of the two teams and took the game to Wolves in the first 15 minutes but were unable to break down the rock steady partnership of Breen and Craddock. Eventually Wolves started to look interested and produced their first real threat in the 19th minute when Johnson crossed from the right to Ricketts at the back post, the ball was nodded down to Henry, playing against his former club. but the midfielder saw his diving header blocked by Duberry, However, Wolves were in front just 60 seconds later though as Clarke went on a mazy run which took him past three Stoke defenders before firing a low shot from right to left and under Simonsen for his first goal of the campaign. The advantage would have been doubled but for a superb reaction save from Simonsen who denied Johnson at point-blank range following Ricketts cross in the 39th minute.





Most of the play was now in the Stoke half but a

lack of concentration could have been costly just before half time when Matt Murray was called on to save one-handed from Fuller before a sharp dive to his right frustrated Sidibe who had fired on the turn.

Even though Stoke finished the livelier of the teams at the end of the first half, they never again posed the same threat in attack in the second period. Wolves should have doubled their advantage after 65 minutes when Davies saw his goalbound shot blocked by Higginbotham, but they did not have to wait long to seal their

success when the unmarked Olofinjana powered home a close-range header from a well flighted Ricketts cross. Wolves never looked troubled in the second half and Stoke's frustration finally boiled over when Hill was sent off five minutes from the end following a second yellow card.

A poor refereeing decision ensured that Wolves were left with a mountain to climb when Gary Breen was sent off after just 23 minutes of this encounter. Cardiff showed 10 man Wolves no mercy as they piled forward and made their one man advantage count to take all three points with a 4-0 victory and extend their lead at the top of the Championship.



Both teams were prepared to attack from

the opening whistle until Wolves were left with a hopeless task when Breen was shown a red card for violent conduct by referee Pat Miller. Breen went up for a challenge with Thompson and in the appeal that followed to the linesman he lifted his arms and appeared to

catch the Cardiff player in the face. Not even a quick tactical substitution and formation change by Mick McCarthy could stop the inevitable Cardiff pressure and this led to them taking the lead just before the break. Parry's corner swirled into the area and Olofinjana allowed Scimeca to rise for a free header, which he placed into the bottom corner of the net.

A troubled afternoon for Wolves showed no signs of improving as Cardiff doubled their lead five minutes after the break with an own goal. Parry swung over a cross and Mulgrew's header struck the unlucky Craddock on the chest before flying into the net past the helpless Matt Murray.

The game was all but over when Kamara struck Cardiff's third with a right-footed drive low into the corner of the net. Parry completed the rout scoring the fourth with a drive from the edge of the box, leaving Mick McCarthy's team with just three points from their last four games.

WOLVES 1-0 COLCHESTER UNITED 14th October 2006

In a closely contested game Wolves were good value for the three points gained against a spirited Colchester United, it was a tough match against the Championship newcomers who were on a run of 6 games undefeated. The visitors scon found themselves

on the back foot as Wolves took the game to them from the onset and the early pressure nearly paid off in the fifth minute when Ricketts lifted his effort well over the bar from 10 yards out. After 15 minutes Bothroyd was even closer when he fired a fierce drive from about 20 yards out which rattled goalkeeper Davison's right hand post. Soon after, as the home team piled forward, a spectacular long range shot from Johnson zoomed narrowly over the Colchester crossbar.

Garcia wasted a good opportunity for the visitors when he shot wide from ten yards out after a header was nodded on from a corner. But Wolves were soon back on the attack with an angled shot from Ricketts going through the arms of Davies on and trickling inches wide of the far post. In stoppage time the keeper made another good save when he turned behind an effort from Olofinjana after Ricketts had seen his shot blocked by a defender.



Both sides ran out unchanged for the start of the second half which opened in earnest when Ricketts earned a free kick on the Wolves left. From his low delivery into the six yard box Bothroyd slid in late to open the scoring in the 50th minute. Moments later and with Colchester on the back foot. Wolves could have doubled their advantage when Johnson dithered too long in the box before feeding Potter a misplaced pass which was driven over the crossbar. In a rare Colchester attack an effort from midfielder Izzet was inadvertently blocked by Clapham and then Cureton nodded wide in the next attack. With 15 minutes remaining Izzet's effort forced Wolves goalkeeper Matt Murray into his first save of the game as the shot was touched onto the right hand post.

A solid display in defence coupled with a slice of good luck by the way of an own goal helped Wolves to all three points in this close midlands derby. Mick McCarthy would have been very content with the defence who kept their seventh clean sheet of the season but concerned by the continuing lack of goals from his strikers.

Chances were far and few between until the deadlock was broken in the 18th minute. Jemal Johnson began



accelerating past the Coventry midfield before releasing

Ricketts into space to cross the ball to Olofinjana, who spun on the penalty spot before sending in a shot which deflected off Ward and past the wrong footed Marshall into the bottom right corner.

The strike pairing of Johnson and Bothroyd were proving to be a constant threat with the two combining to almost double the lead. Johnson found Bothroyd down the right flank who then crossed to the back post where Henry was a whisker away from



connecting with the ball. Coventry enjoyed much of the possession in the final 15 minutes of the half although Murray was rarely troubled.

Wolves continued to push forward in the second half with Olofiniana and Johnson both testing Marshall early on. Wolves should have doubled their lead in the 70th minute. Clarke made a well timed run to meet Potter's free kick from wide on the right, but his powerful six yard effort flew just above the right angle of the post with Marshall beaten. Only minutes later Wolves were handed a golden opportunity to seal the points, Olofinjana's pass sent Davies clean through but the striker's first touch took him too wide enabling Coventry defender Page to recover and make an interception.

Coventry enjoyed long spells of possession in the second half but failed to pose any threat in attack and what little they could muster up front was easily dealt with by Murray. Breen was again outstanding at the heart of the defence and ironically it was he who came closest to netting for the away side, slicing a cross agonisingly over his own bar.

Wolves were overrun in every department during a dismal first half of the first local derby with WBA in five years and it came as no surprise when Greening put the home side ahead in the 11th minute. Koumas rolled the ball into the path of the former Man United reject 20 yards from goal afforded acres of space he steadied himself before hitting an unstoppable shot past the diving Murray.

Wolves only contribution of the first half came in the 17th minute when they were presented with an opportunity to equalise but crucially squandered it. Zuberbuhler in the home team's goal, whose handling was suspect all match, spilled a long range drive from Bothroyd, the ball ran to Potter who wasted the chance as he fired the ball straight back at the recovering goalkeeper. It was a crucial miss as the home team effectively put the game out of Wolves reach ten minutes later. Jamie Clapham allowed himself to be muscled out of the way down the right flank by full back Albrechtsen and the eventual cross was headed in by the unmarked Kamara past the exposed Murray from the edge of the six yard box.

Following the break and with nothing to lose apart from pride Wolves took the game to their local rivals, they looked a different team and showed a bit of urgency forcing a string of corners with Ricketts causing all kinds of problems. Johnson had a shot on the turn deflected wide, Olofinjana was not far off target with a long range effort and Zuberbuhler got his body behind a Bothroyd volley.

Wolves got caught on the break with six minutes remaining while still pushing forward in the hope of salvaging something from the game. Substitute Little was adjudged to have brought down Kamara just inside the box and up stepped Hartson to despatch the penalty to make it 3-0.

Leon Clarke was recalled to the starting line up in the place of Jemal Johnson and bagged a brace in the process.



Wolves had most of the early attacking play but nearly fell behind in the 23rd minute when

Tudgay saw his 25 yard shot tipped over by Murray, while Ricketts was denied by Jones at the other end. Murray also foiled Burton before Wolves deservedly edged ahead on the half hour mark when Clarke rose to head home Clapham's centre from the left of the six-yard box. Wednesday's equaliser came in the 36th minute following a mistake by Clapham whose loose ball was intercepted by Small who then burst into the area from the right and took advantage of a fortunate bounce to steer over Murray from 12 yards.

The high tempo was maintained in the second half with Wednesday taking



the initiative and Tudgay being denied by a Rob Edwards' goal line clearance following a half-clearance by Murray. And it was the same Wednesday player who brought a tremendous save from Murray in the build-up to his side's second goal in the 53rd minute, Edwards only partly dealt with the loose ball and Brunt fired home. A goal in each half gave Southampton a 2-0 win over Wolves in a dire encounter at the St Mary's Stadium, it was Wolves fourth away defeat in succession each without scoring a goal David Wheater on loan from Middlesborough made his Wolves debut in the centre of defence and Cort came in for the injured Bothroyd.

In an uninspiring first half neither side managed a worthwhile shot at goal until Wright-Phillips struck six minutes before the break, he turned Breen inside out before curling a shot past Murray from the edge of the penalty box. WOLVES 3-1 SOUTHEND

4th November 2006

Following the midweek shambles at Southampton. Wolves got back to winning ways with a 3-1 victory over basement team Southend at Molineux.

All the Wolves goals came in the first half with a pair from Leon Clarke and



a stunning goal from Jody Craddock. Southend started the livelier of the two teams and could have taken the lead as early as the first minute when a free kick from outside the area rattled the top of Murray's crossbar. Following a scrappy first ten minutes in which Wolves constantly gave away possession they suddenly took the lead, Edwards sent Gobern chasing a bail down the right flank and when the youngster pulled the ball back across the area the keeper fumbled the ball to Clarke who despatched the ball into the net.

Two minutes later it was 2-0 when a Breen free kick was nodded down by Cort to Craddock who hit an unstoppable over the shoulder volley into the net via the underside of the bar.
