Have a great summer break, and I look forward to seeing you at our AGM which is being held on the 28th July at our usual venue.



MATCH REPORTS



A CUT ABOVE THE REST

SOUTHEND 0-1 WOLVES

Saturday 2nd December 2006

Wolves kept their sights on the Championship play-offs after earning their first win in five games even though it was a lacklustre performance against bottom team Southend. Michael McIndoe started in the opening line up for the first time and Michael Kightly made his debut against his former club, Lewis Gubern and Daniel Jones were the players left out and Jay Bothroyd returned for Leon Clarke in attack.



In a first half that was best forgotten both teams failed to get a grip on a game that became a scrappy affair with chances at both ends few and far

between. It wasn't until the 24th minute that Wolves created their first real chance and should have grabbed the lead when McIndoe cut in from the left and raced clear of the home defence, instead of shooting he chose to square the ball to Johnson but it was too far ahead of the onrushing striker who could only watch as the ball fled past him. Southend striker Freddy Eastwood wasted the home team's best chance moments later when the sought-after striker controlled the high ball in an instant but sent his shot high over the crossbar from eight yards.

Wolves started in a more determined fashion at the start of the second half and should have been ahead within five minutes of the restart when Southend keeper Flahavan pulled off a superb save to keep out Bothroyd's low drive. McIndoe then missed an absolute sitter when he smashed the ball against the left-hand post from six yards after connecting with Bothroyd's cross from the byline.

Johnson headed another Bothroyd cross wide before Wolves finally took the lead on the hour. Craddock bravely dived in among a sea of bodies to head McIndoe's inswinging free-kick past Flahavan before coming off worst following a collision with Sodje. After lengthy treatment Craddock, although conscious was stretchered out of the action with a nasty gash above his left



eye and taken to hospital as a precautionary measure, it was the defenders third goal of the season but he is unlikely to remember too much about it.

At the end of this forgettable game Wolves held on for four minutes of stoppage time to secure their first victory since Southend were the visitors to Molineux last month and finally secure all three points after throwing away good winning positions in their last two games.

OUT FOXED

WOLVES 1-2 LEICESTER CITY

Saturday 9th December 2006

For the third home game in a row Wolves dominated the majority of the play and failed to convert a host of goal scoring chances put in front of them before conceding a late goal. The final statistics showed that the home team had 13 goal attempts with only three managing to hit the target whereas Leicester had two attempts scoring two goals and ending a four match losing streak.



Wolves picked up where they finished off the previous weekend at Southend with a shocking first half display against a Leicester side who on this showing will be battling against relegation at the end of the season. It was dire watching and we had to wait until the 21st minute to

see the first real chance and it was Wolves striker Bothroyd who duly squandered it, Gubern delivered a good cross which was met by Bothroyd six yards out but he managed to place his header wide when it seemed easier to score.

The visitors had hardly ventured into the Wolves half but still took the lead against the run of play in the 38th minute with the first shot on target from either side. Hammond ran onto a pass from Hume and held off a challenge from Breen before he hit a low angled shot past Matt Murray. Wolves tried to raise the tempo following the shock of going behind and nearly equalised in first-half injury time when Gubern saw his spectacular 30-yard drive hit the crossbar.

At half time Wolves manger McCarthy introduced Craig Davies for Johnson in a bid to spark his strike force into life and get his side back into the game. Despite the greater urgency and effort there was still a general lack of quality up front and for all the chances created the home team never really looked like converting those chances. However the incessant second-half pressure was eventually rewarded with an equaliser in the 81st minute from Gubern. A corner taken by McIndoe was partially cleared by the Leicester defence but the ball fell to Gubern on the edge of the box and his right foot volley bounced before it hit the post and went in.

Just when it seemed that the teams would share the 'spoils' at 1-1 Wolves wasted all their second half efforts by gifting the three points to Leicester. In the last minute of normal playing time Porter cut in from the left and beat defender Little before hitting a low shot that Murray got a hand to but couldn't keep out.

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HIGH AS A KIGHT

QPR 0-1 WOLVES

Saturday 16th December 2006

This certainly was a game of two halves with Wolves continuing their recent poor form with a dire performance in the first half but then playing probably their best 45 minutes of football for the season in the second half.

Neither team showed much quality in the early stages of the game and supporters had to wait until the 23rd minute for the first real goalmouth action. Wolves were looking susceptible when defending set pieces on or around the area and it was one of these dead ball situations which was only half-cleared by the defence allowing Bircham to head back across the area where Smith found himself unmarked only to head straight at Matt Murray. Soon after another free-kick was pumped into their box, Murray came to punch but collided with Breen, the ball fell to Rowlands on the volley but he could only scoop his effort over the bar. Seven minutes later the visitors once again found themselves unable to defend a free-kick, this time Murray was forced into a spectacular reflex save to keep out a Jones header from Smith's cross.

After failing to record a single shot on target in the whole of the first half Wolves looked like a different team after the break and immediately laid siege on the QPR goal, they were soon rewarded in the 49th minute when they took the lead. McIndoe played a low ball in from the left which found Kightly who turned his man to drill the ball into the bottom right hand corner of the net. That was his first goal for the club and he nearly scored a second on 58 minutes when he broke clear in midfield and hit a stinging shot which took a deflection and forced Royce into a flying save. Three minutes later the 20-year-old again found himself in the thick of the action when he was one on one with the keeper but when he hesitated and tried to setup Potter he underhit the ball allowing the keeper to clear.



Royce was kept busy until the very end by an inspired Wolves side as Rangers struggled to get out of their own half and was forced into saves from a Potter 25 yard shot and a Craddock header. Kightly missed a sitter in the closing stages but a single goal was enough to keep McCarthy's side in the play-off hunt.

CRADDOCK SHOWS DELIA HOW TO ROAST CANARIES

WOLVES 2-2 NORWICH CITY

Saturday 23rd December 2006

Wolves Centre-back Jody Craddock grabbed an injury-time equaliser as Wolves twice came from behind to share the spoils with Norwich. A point was the least that Wolves deserved as they dominated most of the game but again failed to convert a host of goal scoring chances.

Norwich had most of the early possession and opened the scoring on 10 minutes when Wolves old boy Carl Robinson created the opportunity for Earnshaw to lob the ball home from close range. Following the setback of conceding an early goal the home side pushed forward and created their first real chance on the quarter hour when a free-kick was awarded 25 yards out, Kightly stepped up to take the kick but couldn't keep it down and the ball flew into the crowd. Kightly was proving to be Wolves main threat and had two efforts in quick succession, firstly he hit a rising shot that flew just over before drilling another long range effort that was blocked by the Norwich defence.

Wolves were now beginning to take control of the game but were given a sharp reminder that Norwich were still dangerous on the break when Earnshaw saw his shot rebound off the crossbar in the 22nd minute. That was the wake-up call Wolves needed and they moved up a gear and deservedly equalised nine minutes before

half-time when Henry volleyed home from the edge of the area following a blocked shot from Kightly. The goal signalled the start of almost total Wolves domination in which Kightly and McIndoe were the outstanding performers causing continuous panic in the visitors defence.

The home team continued to lay siege on the Norwich goal after the break but after soaking up all the pressure Norwich gave warning of what was to come when Dublin had the ball in the net 16 minutes from time only to have the effort ruled out for offside. The respite for Wolves was only temporary as Earnshaw scored with an overhead kick two minutes later.

Norwich keeper Gallacher made two good saves as Wolves pressed for an equaliser. When it looked like the home side were going to finish pointless Craddock continued his recent goal scoring form to grab the



levelled three minutes into stoppage time when he netted with a low drive from Mark Little's cross.

DERBY COUNTY 0-2 WOLVES

Tuesday 26th December 2006

Derby's biggest crowd in nearly three years saw their team beaten by a solid and resilient Wolves team who sealed the points with two second-half goals from Seyi George Olofinjana and Michael Kightly at Pride Park. Neill Collins the on-loan Sunderland centre-half made his Wolves debut as a replacement for injured Jody Craddock

It was Kightly who produced the first shot of the game with six minutes gone when he cut in from the right but fired a left-footed

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shot well over the Derby crossbar. Wolves threatened again three minutes later when Leon Clarke collected a pass from McIndoe but failed to get any power on his shot after being forced wide. Kightly who seemed to be in the thick of the action again came close on the quarter hour when he had a shot saved by Bywater from the edge of the box, moments later the same player saw another long range effort drift just wide.

Matt Murray in the Wolves goal had hardly been threatened when on 20 minutes he pulled off a superb save to deny Johnson, but just moments later he could only watch as a deflected free kick struck the defensive wall and looped onto the top of the crossbar with the keeper rooted to the spot.

There were no substitutions made during the break and within a minute of the restart Wolves had loud appeals for a penalty turned down after Edworthy appeared to handle the ball in the area when challenged by McIndoe. Derby almost went in front five minutes later when Oakley crossed from the left and the incoming Howard hit the inside of the post before the ball was cleared.

Derby started to push forward and just when it seemed they were taking the initiative Wolves took the lead in the 67th minute, Mark Little crossed from the right and Olofinjana directed a downward header back across Bywater and into the corner of the net. The home team pressed forward in search of an equaliser but the Wolves defence stood solid, denying Derby any real goal scoring chances. During stoppage



time and with Derby committing players forward Kightly made the game safe when he ran clear after a clever pass from Davies and clipped the ball over Bywater in front of the delighted travelling fans.

It was a case of "After the Lord Mayor's Show" during a rain swept afternoon at Layer Road Colchester. Following the superb victory at Derby on Boxing Day all the hard work was undone in 90 minutes of tedium at a ground not fit to host Sunday morning football never mind Championship standard.

Colchester went straight at Wolves from the kick off and could have opened the scoring after only 18 seconds when Cureton was denied by Murray who reacted smartly to tip the strikers shot around the post. Colchester only had to wait until the fourth minute to take the lead, Cureton was adjudged to have been fouled on the edge of the penalty area by Collins and the Colchester striker stepped up himself to fire the free-kick through the defensive wall and into the net.

Murray remained busy in a fast and furious opening 15 minutes and produced two fine saves from Garcia and McLoud. Wolves looked to have weathered the early onslaught and were now beginning to enjoy a lot more of the possession. In the 26th minute they created their best effort when a Mark Little cross was headed goalwards by Leon Clarke only to be palmed away by the home keeper Gerken. Colchester were looking dangerous on the break and right on the stroke of half time proved the point when Iwelumo blatantly used his hand to control the ball before brushing off Breen and driving the ball between Murray's legs to make the half time scoreline 2-0.

Wolves had a series of half chances early in the second half and midfielder Olofinjana was guilty of missing twice from close in, he scuffed wide from a cross by Ricketts and was then unable to convert



McIndoe's free-kick from point-blank range. Murray then denied Jamie Guy from close range before Wolves did

manage a goal in stoppage time when Collins got on the end of a free-kick from Potter and steered the ball home, the goal was too little, too late and gave Colchester their 11th successive home win.

BARNLEY GIVEN THE CHOP

WOLVES 2-0 BARNLEY

Monday 1st January 2007

Wolves scored two second half goals to claim their first home win since the beginning of November. It was a comfortable victory and would have been a much bigger margin except for the form of Barnsley goalkeeper Nick Colgan who denied the home team with a series of fine saves. Prior to kick-off Wolves had confirmed the permanent signings of loan wingers Michael Kightly for a nominal fee and Michael McIndoe for a fee reported to be in the region of £250,000 with both players contracted until the end of the 2008-09 season.

Wolves took the initiative from the opening whistle and the Barnsley defence were soon under pressure when an early free kick from Kightly had to be blocked by the Barnsley defensive wall. It was the woodwork which saved Barnsley in the ninth minute when Darren Potter fired in a long-range shot which hit the base of Colgan's right-hand post and bounced to safety. The Barnsley keeper was constantly in the thick of the action and when he managed to keep out a McIndoe angled drive Craig Davies followed up only to see a defender clear the ball off the goal line. In the 27th minute Wolves were awarded a penalty after Atkinson hauled down McIndoe. But after Potter had overruled McIndoe to claim the spot-kick, Colgan dived low to his left to turn ball around the post. Further chances went begging as half time approached but Barnsley held on to go into the break on level terms.

Both sides ran out unchanged for the start of a second half which was just seven minutes old when the Barnsley defence was unlocked as Olofinjana worked the ball into Henry, the midfielder took the ball in his stride and then showed a cool head as he slotted the ball past Colgan's outstretched right hand from 10 yards out. The lead was

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nearly doubled moments after the restart when Colgan again saved from a position close to where Henry had just scored from.

Olofinjana sent
ightly clear in



the 68th minute, but the wide man could only fire wide after racing in from the

right ahead of Colgan saving from Jackie McNamara. At the other end, Murray saved spectacularly to deny Atkinson before Olofinjana made it comfortable for Wolves when he tapped home from a Davies pull-back in the 78th minute to make the points safe.

Oldham deservedly shared the spoils in the FA Cup third round tie against Wolves at Molineux. Striker Chris Hall stepped off the bench to earn the Coca-Cola League One side a replay with a late header in a 2-2 draw.

The game started lively but goal scoring chances were far and few between until the lower league team took the lead in the 19th minute with a goal from Warne, he collected a quickly taken free-kick from the right by-line and hit a low right foot shot past Murray from 15 yards.

The home side responded well and found an equaliser thanks to the persistence of McIndoe, the winger played a one-two with Olofinjana before hitting a shot from the edge of the penalty area which beat

Oldham goalkeeper Pogliacomi and came off the far post to leave the Nigerian midfielder with a simple tap-in from the rebound. Wolves went ahead with three minutes of the half remaining when Craig Davies scored his first goal for the club, Ricketts sent over a cross and Davies got across his marker to power a header into the roof of the net.



On the hour mark injured defender Gary Breen was replaced by Rob Edwards before Oldham also made a change when they bought on Hall, he immediately made his presence felt when he went close with a powerful header from 10 yards. In the 78th minute Hall got on the end of Liddell's right wing free-kick to flick a header over Wolves goalkeeper Murray from 12 yards to confirm the draw and book a replay at Boundary Park.

McCARTHY SUFFERS BOUT OF WIND

STOKE CITY 1-1 WOLVES

Saturday 13th January 2007

On a wind swept afternoon the honours were shared at the Britannia Stadium when Stoke grabbed a point with a late equaliser conceded from yet another set piece, this proved a disappointing end to the game after some robust second half defending from Wolves.

Despite doubts regarding his fitness Wolves

received a boost when defender Gary Breen was deemed fit to start despite struggling with an ankle injury sustained in the cup clash with Oldham. Breen's presence had an immediate impact when the popular centre-half was on hand to clear a menacing Sidibe cross after just two minutes.

There were no real clear cut goal scoring opportunities until the 19th minute when Fuller looked to have given the home side the lead, only for the woodwork to intervene. Fuller broke forward and past Collins before hitting a left-footed shot from the edge of the area against Matt Murray's near post. Stoke were equally fortunate 10 minutes later when Michael Kightly picked up a loose ball 25 yards out and struck a fierce shot against the bar in what was the last real chance of the half.

Wolves were forced to change their line-up during the break when Clapham replaced the injured McNamara. As the hour mark loomed Stoke looked to be celebrating the opening goal when Murray charged out from his goal line. The Wolves keeper was left flapping at thin air as Lawrence lifted the ball towards an unguarded net only to watch the swirling wind drag his effort inches wide.



Wanderers then took the lead in the 63rd minute from a Michael McIndoe right-wing corner. McIndoe swung the ball in left footed and Collins darted ahead of the home defenders to score with a near-post header for his second league goal of the season. The same combination almost led to a second goal four minutes later, but this time Stoke goalkeeper Simonsen produced a point blank save and tipped Collins' header over the bar. The save had extra significance five minutes from time, when Hill netted Stoke's equaliser. A disputed free-kick by Lawrence found Hill who was given a free header and the simple task of heading in at the far post.

LANCASHIRE HOT POTTER **OLDHAM ATHLETIC 0-2 WOLVES**

Tuesday 16th January 2007 (FA Cup Third Round Replay)

Midfielder Darren Potter scored his first senior goal for Wolves on the way to a replay victory over Oldham and set up a local derby against rivals West Brom in the fourth round. The sides drew 2-2 at Molineux and Oldham once again gave Wolves a scare by having the best of the first half before the visitors took control of matters in the second half.

On a night of heavy rain in Lancashire Wolves started with five men in midfield giving them plenty of early possession, but making it difficult for themselves to get bodies forward during an uneventful opening period. The hosts settled quickly and created the first real chance when Potter fired high and wide from 20 yards in the ninth minute. The visitors finally managed an attack of note when Henry blocked a goal bound shot and gave the ball to Potter, he progressed to the edge of the box before feeding the ball to Ricketts who cut in from the left and curled a shot narrowly over.

The chance of the half came with just over 20 minutes gone when a long ball found Stam in the box and the Oldham defender's shot was turned wide by Murray. On the half hour Wolves forced Oldham Keeper Pogliacomi to save for the first time when lone striker Craig Davies glanced in a goal ward header from McIndoe's cross. Oldham continued to stretch the Wolves defence and Potter looked odds on to score but somehow failed to get a head on Warne's cross in the final minute of the first half.

Three times at the start of the second half Chopra was denied a second goal for Cardiff, twice he was frustrated by Murray before the woodwork then came to the rescue. Wolves pressed forward and moments later Olofinjana hit the post from a Davies cross. However a minute later Wolves were deservedly level when the same pair combined in identical fashion with Olofinjana finishing the move and slotting home from point-blank range. His goal owed everything to the direct play of Kightly who was always in the thick of things and running the Cardiff defence ragged with his pace and enthusiasm. Wolves started the brighter with four corners in as many minutes but without threatening or causing any real scares, and it was the

home team that launched the evenings first worthwhile attack when Koumas supplied a cross which Phillips just failed to connect with. Wolves split the home defence in the ninth minute when a fine three man move created an opening for Andy Keogh, but his touch deserted him and he could only blaze the ball over the crossbar. It seemed that the Wolves defence had learned nothing from the first leg and in the 22nd minute had a lucky escape when the clinical Phillips was left wide open only for the striker to miss the target from a Koumas cross.

After the break the stalemate continued and Wolves were still in the tie but creating very little in the way of goal scoring chances. In the 62nd minute as West Brom started to apply the pressure Hennessey dived to his right to save Kamara's curling effort but three minutes later the deadlock was broken. Koren crossed from the left and this time Breen was made to pay for the lack of marking when Phillips rose unchallenged to pick his spot and head home. Moments later though Wolves nearly grabbed a dramatic equaliser when West Brom defender Sodje miss hit a back pass that left Kiely stranded, but the defender scampered back to prevent an own goal as the ball was just about to cross the line.

Hennessey's heroics again denied Koren at point-blank range, while at the other end

Bothroyd failed to capitalise on a high bouncing opportunity to square affairs on the night when he hooked the ball over the bar with 10 minutes remaining. That was basically it for the season as far as Wolves were concerned. On a brighter note the current squad of youngsters brought together by Mick McCarthy, even though failing at the final hurdle to get to the Promised Land bodes for a promising future, which couldn't have been said for the prima donna's that Glenda Hoddle left at the end of the previous season.
